Three Required Courses

Introduction to Christianity or Introduction to Islam (3 credits). Students should consult with Rev. John Crossin at the Consortium, or Dean Ahmed Alwani of the Graduate School of Islamic and Social Sciences, in order to determine which course is required.

Interreligious Dialogue (3 credits), including how Christians and Muslims understand one another, the nature of religious conflict, processes of mediation, and conflict resolution.

Practical Issues between Muslims and Christians (3 credits). This course will examine three areas of shared concern between Muslim and Christian communities in the United States:

1. *Spiritual resources in our respective traditions to sustain individual believers during their transitions from birth to maturity to death*
2. *The responsibility of leaders in relation to the community of believers*
3. *Relations of the community of believers to society at large, including civic participation and bearing witness.*
